# Lingering cough

New study shows many Ground Zero workers face serious illness

A new medical report released yesterday details serious health consequences for rescue workers and babies born to expectant mothers who were exposed to airborne smoke, dust and chemicals released at Ground Zero.

The National Institute of Health study found a two-fold increase in low birth weights among babies born to pregnant women who were either in or around the World Trade Center on Sept. 11.

It also found that one-quarter of rescue workers at Ground Zero suffered from "World Trade Center cough" and "profound adverse effects on respiratory health."

"The collapse of the towers generated thousands of tons of particulate matter comprised of cement dust, glass fibers, asbestos, lead . . . many of which significantly increased the subjects' susceptibility to bronchial spasms and asthma" said the study's chief author, Dr. Philip Landrigan, chair of the environmental medicine program at Mount Sinai School of Medicine.

Landrigan said: "These respiratory effects were most pronounced in subjects who were in or around the WTC buildings during the first 12 hours of the disaster."

Rescue workers examined 2 1/2 years after the attack had increased instances of coughs, wheezing, shortness of breath, and hyper-sensitive bronchial tubes directly related to the intensity and duration of their exposure. More than 30% of firefighters who had at least moderate exposure at Ground Zero suffer from

chronic bronchial spasms that are triggered by commonplace pollutants such as cigarette smoke or car exhaust.

Mice exposed to the dust suffered the same type of bronchial ailments, the study found.

### ADDITIONAL CONCERN:

- Will pulmonary disease persist in 9/11 workers exposed to dust?
- Will instances of mesothelioma, a type of cancer related to asbestos exposure, increase?
- Will exposure to toxins increase risk of cancer, diabetes and other chronic disease?
- Will babies born with low birth weight suffer long-term problems?



The research found that pregnant women who were inside the towers or lived within a 10-block radius had smaller babies, but ruled out post-traumatic stress disorder as a factor and said it was caused by air pollutants.

Residents who live within a one-mile-radius of the World Trade Center site also reported that they had more breathing problems than people who lived in other areas.

The study expressed concerns about the health consequences of asbestos exposure, noting hundreds of tons of it were blasted free when the North Tower fell.

# One step closer to one-seat ride

**Gov. Pataki is expected to announce long-awaited plans tomorrow for direct, one-seat rail access from Long Island to Lower Manhattan.**

A spokeswoman for the governor refused to comment, but sources tell amNewYork that officials are leaning toward digging a new tunnel beneath the East River to connect Kennedy Airport to Lower Manhattan using the Long Island Rail Road.

Now that the N train no longer runs through the Montague St. tunnel with the R train, there's also been discussion of using that tunnel, the sources said. Consultants have studied four options: Routing the LIRR through the Montague tunnel, the Cranberry tunnel used by the A and C trains, both tunnels or a new tunnel.

During a redevelopment speech before the Association for a Better New York, the governor is expected to answer long-standing logistical and funding questions.

When the Port Authority announced its new lease agreement with the city for Kennedy and La Guardia airports, it pledged \$560 million toward the airport access project. But the Straphangers Campaign, Transportation Alternatives and other groups have objected to discussions of using roughly \$1 billion in federal Community Development Block Grants as a down payment on the tunnel.

"It's the wrong way to spend this precious money," the advocates wrote to the governor and Mayor Bloomberg.

## Recycle vanity plates wheeling into public

A new "Recycle New York" custom license plate was rolled out yesterday by the Pataki administration, with supporters believing they will become virtual bumper stickers for the promotion of recycling programs.



ing a portion of the plate's special charges toward recycling programs. David Higby, project director for the Environmental Advocates of New York, said he has a customized bluebird license plate because \$25 of the annual charge goes into the state Environmental Protection Fund to protect open space.

A DMV spokesman, Joseph Picchi, said the new recycling plates "promote awareness of recycling," Picchi said.

The plates with numbers assigned by the DMV cost \$43 initially and have a \$25 renewal fee.

The plate was developed at the request of the state Association for Reduction, Reuse & Recycling, state Department of Motor Vehicles' officials said, and unveiled at a convention of the Federation of New York Solid Waste Associations at a resort on Lake George north of Albany.

The "New York Recycles" plates includes the universal symbol for recycling in green and the words "Reduce, reuse, recycle."

## NJ hospitals get \$7M for health crises

TRENTON — The state health department handed out more than \$7 million in grants to 95 hospitals and health facilities yesterday in an effort to improve their ability to respond to public health emergencies, including bioterrorism.

The grants range from \$5,000 to \$165,000 and will help boost the health care system's ability to deal with chemical, biological, radiological or nuclear incidents.

"New Jersey has been challenged by emerging infectious diseases like West Nile virus and SARS," said Clifton Lacy, commissioner of health and senior services. "Because of our location, population density and potential terrorist targets, our state must continue to be at the forefront of preparedness nationally."

## Bias stats on rise

High number of anti-Muslim incidents reported in NY

New York state was only behind California in the number of complaints of anti-Muslim bias incidents last year, a chapter of a national Islamic civil liberties group said yesterday.

Firdos Abdul-Munim attributed bias to negative portrayals of Muslims, as well as tensions over the situation in Iraq and Afghanistan following the 9/11 attacks.

Meanwhile, bias incidents

against Muslims in New Jersey more than tripled last year. The number of incidents reported directly to CAIR by individual complainants rose from 12 in 2002 to 40 in 2003.

Pace of MTA reforms are slow in Albany

**A year ago, New Yorkers' suspicions about the MTA were confirmed when it turned out the authority kept a second set of books, a deficit that helped it win a fare hike over muted opposition.**

State Comptroller Alan Hevesi exposed the trickery, along with City Comptroller Bill Thompson. Then the NYPIRG Straphangers Campaign challenged the 50-cent hike and won in federal court before ultimately losing before an appeals panel.

Since then, the MTA has made several moves to clean up its act, like appointing six financial whizzes to advise Executive Director Katie Lapp on ways to reform its budget adoption routine.

Also, the agency's long-time budget director retired, replaced by officials less enmeshed in the MTA's culture of secrecy.

But most important, the MTA started releasing more budget documents much earlier. Riders can now get a full preview of service cut and

fare hike proposals as July, as opposed to in December, which was when the information used to be released.

Not that this did very much good last year, when the MTA pulled elevator operators out of five Washington Heights stations and pretended it wasn't cutting service.



The MTA is making slow but steady progress toward reforming its budget adoption process.

While the MTA has much more to do, this is a start. If by Assemblyman Richard Brodsky (D-Westchester) the MTA does announce service cut and fare hike proposals in July, as expected, the Straphangers Campaign's Gene Russianoff predicts a "loud and healthy debate" But with no Senate sponsors, the bill seems stuck for another year.

## Sales tax to end in July, not June

**ALBANY** The state Legislature voted yesterday to delay by at least one month the scheduled elimination of the state's 4.25% sales tax on clothing and footwear items selling for less than \$110. A new date of July 1 was established for the sales tax to disappear. Under the budget approved by legislators in 2003 over Gov. George Pataki's vetoes, the tax was to have been eliminated as of June 1. But Michael Marr, a spokesman for Pataki's Budget Division, said a delay is necessary to give state leaders more time to negotiate a new 2004-05 budget and to help the state Department of Taxation and Finance properly inform retailers about an imposing change in the tax tables.

## Panel to report on military posts

**TRENTON** As the federal government considers a new round of base closings, Gov. James McGreevey has charged a panel to show how New Jersey's military posts are vital to national defense and security. Citing the importance of the state's military installations after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, McGreevey said he wants the commission to find ways for the state's seven military and two U.S. Coast Guard installations to expand and grow. The panel will have 90 days to issue its first report. The commission comes as the Department of Defense is considering closing as many as 125 of the nation's roughly 500 military installations next year.

## Piano Man's car grill for sale

**WEST BABYLON** A radio station has collected the smashed front grill from Billy Joel's car wreck last month — the third in two years for Joel — and is auctioning it off for charity. WBLI morning show co-host Steve Harper said yesterday that the grill is being offered on eBay.com, where it will remain until 12:45 p.m. Thursday. The debris was collected off the street at the crash site by the station's "Slam the Stunt Man," Harper said. A Nassau County police spokesman said Joel has not complained that he wants the grill back, so there is no legal reason the station can't sell the debris. Joel suffered minor injuries when he lost control of his vintage 1967 Citroen near his Long Island home, slamming into a house.

## SUNY trustee calls for evaluations

**ALBANY** State University of New York Trustee Candace de Russy yesterday called for faculty to be evaluated for productivity to be sure instructors are either in the classroom or doing important research. "I would like more detailed information on that on a campus-by-campus and program-by-program basis," said de Russy, chairwoman of the SUNY trustees' Academic Standards Committee. She had confronted the board in 2002, saying it didn't do enough to cut costs before raising tuition to levels she feared would be too costly to some families. Her comments riled the United University Professions, the union representing most SUNY faculty. "There are constant evaluations of higher education faculty," said William Scheuerman, president of UUP.

## 'Priestess' stole bones for rites

**NEWARK** A 61-year-old woman accused of being a high priestess in the Palo Mayombe religious cult was convicted yesterday of stealing human remains from cemeteries. Miriam Mirabal was found guilty of theft, conspiracy to commit theft and burglary. Assistant Essex County Prosecutor Dean Maglione said Mirabal stole the human remains for the purpose of practicing Palo Mayombe, rites in which human remains are placed into cauldrons so that practitioners can call on spirits of the dead to cast misfortune on others. She is scheduled to be sentenced June 25. (AP)

# PC virus 'worms' into world's computers

**The Sasser worm will only get sassier over the coming days, computer security experts warn.**

Yesterday, thousands of computer networks around the world were shut down by the virus-like program that spreads through a flaw in the Microsoft Windows operating system. More destructive mutations may be on the way.

"Hackers will look at it and make the payload more malicious," Eric Schultze, chief security architect at Shavlik Technologies, told amNewYork. "It will get worse as the weeks go on."

Already there are reports of a circulating e-mail that claims to be a Sasser patch but is actually another worm.

Many companies are embarrassed to admit they were hit by the virus. Yesterday, Delta Airlines refused to say if the virus was the reason the company grounded all flights for eight hours. Employees of the



A group or person calling itself "the Skynet" already claimed responsibility for Sasser and another worm.

courier service DHL said the company's computers were down for the day, but DHL did not officially comment.

The virus, named for the flaw in Windows' Local Security Authority Service Subsystem (LSAS), causes

computers to randomly reboot but does not destroy files, collect information or direct computers to another Web site. Microsoft posted a patch for the flaw on April 13.

Security, called Sasser a "poorly designed worm clearly done by an amateur."

Raouf, whose firm discovered the LSAS flaw last October, said a hacker most likely reverse-engineered the worm from the patch.

## Detainees file suit

Suit says men were abused while detained over 9/11

**A Middle Eastern immigrant was violated with a flashlight while being strip searched at federal jail in Brooklyn following the Sept. 11 attacks, a new lawsuit alleges.**

The suit was filed yesterday by the alleged victim, Ehab Elmagraby, and another former detainee, Javaid Iqdal, who both claim they were locked in solitary confinement, beaten and verbally

abused by guards at the same jail. They were later cleared of allegations that they had terrorist ties.

Unlike a pending civil complaint in the same court by other Sept. 11 detainees, the suit identifies individual guards at the Metropolitan Detention Center by their last names and accuses them of more extreme abuses.

Shortly after the men were detained as possible terrorist

suspects, one guard allegedly "inserted a flashlight in (Elmaghraby's) anal cavity" as others watched, the suit said.

The men, both 37, are seeking unspecified damages for physical and emotional harm.

Dan Dunne, a spokeswoman for the Federal Bureau of Prisons, would not comment on the suit but said the bureau was investigating similar allegations against staff members.

## Strike two for Silverstein

**Saying a court defeat was "not a defeat for rebuilding," World Trade Center leaseholder Larry Silverstein vowed yesterday to complete a rebuilding plan even after a jury ruled he could not double most of his \$3.5 billion insurance policy to fund it.**

The jury in U.S. District Court in Manhattan dealt Silverstein his second blow in as many weeks, ruling that the \$877 million owed by the

trade center's largest insurer, Swiss Re International

Business Insurance Co. Limited, could not be doubled. The jury found that the company's policy was bound by a form that defined the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attack as a single event. Silverstein's lawyers want to count it as two attacks for each plane.

Last week, the jury reached the same conclusion regarding the policies of 11 other companies responsible for more than \$1 billion in trade center coverage.

# Osama aide gets 35 years in prison

For stabbing a prison guard, a former top aide to Osama bin Laden was sent to prison for 32 years at an emotional sentencing in which the wheelchair-bound guard shouted, "I look like I'm dead and I am dead."

Mamdouh Mahmud Salim, 46, buried his face in his hands and put his head down as the guard, Louis Pepe, waved a black comb in the air and told how Salim and an accomplice stabbed him in the eye with a black comb they had carved into a knife.

The Nov. 1, 2000 attack left Pepe barely able to see, partially brain damaged and prone to courtroom outbursts that, after several warnings, caused U.S. District Judge Deborah A. Batts to order him removed from court after he had ended a victim statement.

As he was removed, Pepe shouted, "I'm dead! You understand that? I'm dead!"

He was followed out of court by more than a dozen corrections officers, one of whom called upon the others to leave in solidarity for Pepe.

After he left the courtroom, Salim addressed the court, saying, "I'm sorry. I'm trying to understand his (Pepe's) loss."

The judge agreed to a request by prosecutors to enhance the federal sentencing guideline in Salim's case by five years, sending him away for 32 years to what is certain to be a maximum security prison.

The judge called the attack "appalling," saying Salim chose to stab Pepe in the eye in an attack that was an "unusually cruel, brutal, gratuitous infliction of injury."

She also ordered Salim to pay Pepe \$4.7 million, an amount likely never to be paid unless hidden assets are identified somewhere.

Salim testified in a pretrial hearing that he carried out

the attack to try to get the prison keys and stab his two court-appointed lawyers waiting in a nearby conference room so that the judge in a terrorism case would be forced to appoint him new lawyers.

The government maintained that he planned to take hostages and organize a prison escape.

# Drug ring bust

34 collared in drug money laundering ring

Federal prosecutors announced yesterday that they had joined with authorities from Colombia, Canada and England to break up an international money laundering ring with the arrests of 34 defendants.

The dismantling of the ring in a probe dubbed "Operation White Collar" included the forfeiture of \$20 million in laundered drug money to the U.S. government, prosecutors said.

In the scheme, tens of millions of dollars were laundered in the United States, England and Canada through a Colombian black market peso exchange system, prosecutor said.

## B'klyn firm recalls mayo

A Brooklyn company is recalling its mayonnaise because undeclared eggs could cause life-threatening reactions in people with egg allergies.

Lowell International said yesterday it was recalling its 8.8 ounce jars of "Frubex" mayonnaise.

The recall was initiated after routine sampling by the state Department of Agriculture and Markets food inspectors revealed the presence of undeclared eggs.

No illnesses have been reported, officials said.

## L.I. woman guilty in fatal hit-and-run

A Long Island woman was convicted yesterday in the fatal hit-and-run accident that claimed the life of a Hamptons farm worker.

A Suffolk County jury found Leslie Jenneman, 46, of Bridgehampton, guilty of second-degree manslaughter in the 2002 accident that killed 38-year-old Henry Yarrell.

The jury returned its verdict after deliberating for more than three days, said Peter Mayer, chief of the Suffolk County district attorney's major crimes unit.

Jenneman also was convicted of leaving the scene of an incident, a felony, but was acquitted of evidence tampering. She was cleared of two vehicle and traffic violations, but found guilty of failing to stay in her lane.

She faces up to 15 years in prison when she is sentenced June 1.

Jenneman maintained throughout the trial that she thought she hit a deer.

## Mormons take Manhattan

Manhattan's first Mormon temple, intended as an oasis of quiet reflection and religious devotion for 42,000 believers in the New York region, opens next month — an anomaly on the city's pulsating Upper West Side.

Instead of the soaring white spires and other fanciful designs of freestanding Mormon temples elsewhere, the Manhattan version is part of a windowless, six-story building.

It could easily go unnoticed amid luxury high-rises and the Lincoln Center cultural complex across the street.

But starting May 8, the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints will hold a monthlong open house — affording the public a rare glimpse into the inner sanctum of the faith, which claims 12 million adherents worldwide.

# Quattrone is guilty

Jury convicts the former star banker of obstructing justice

**Frank Quattrone**, the high-rolling banker who tried to make his company's paper trail disappear, now has a permanent stain on his own record: three felony convictions.

Tried for the second time for the same offenses, Quattrone was convicted yesterday of obstructing justice and is facing a year in prison.

One of the biggest stars of the Internet boom, technology made Quattrone a millionaire — but technology also brought him down. All it took was a 22-word e-mail.

Soon after the SEC began a probe into Quattrone's company, Credit Suisse First Boston, co-worker Richard Char sent out an e-mail on Dec. 4, 2000 that encouraged investment bankers to "clean up those files" before the holidays. The next day, Quattrone sent a reply to the bankers, citing his own experience as a key witness in a securities trial and adding, "I strongly advise you to follow these procedures."

Quattrone, 48, is the most powerful securities executive to face time behind bars since junk-bond pioneer Michael Milken in 1991. The conviction is the first to stem from investigations of IPO abuses during the Internet boom.

## ABOUT FRANK QUATTRONE:

**AGE:** 48. Born in Philadelphia

**EDUCATION:** Received undergraduate degree in economics in 1977 from the University of Pennsylvania, Wharton School of Business. MBA from Stanford University in 1981.

**CAREER:** Worked briefly for Morgan Stanley before starting his MBA program at Sanford. He returned to Morgan Stanley. He joined Deutsche Bank's technology group as managing director in 1996. Two years later, moved to Credit Suisse First Boston to head its technology group in Palo Alto, Calif.

**FAMILY:** Married to Denise Quattrone.

"The Quattrone trial was about setting an example to the banking community that it wasn't untouchable," said University of Pittsburgh law

professor Doug Branson.

In the late '90s, Quattrone rose to stardom in the banking industry. He took companies like Amazon.com and

Netscape public.

"Our investigative process depends on our ability to obtain documents," SEC spokesman John Heine said. "This case shows that the consequences of interfering with the process are severe, and they should be."

Quattrone, whose first trial ended in a hung jury in October, made \$120 million at CSFB in 2000.

His sentencing is scheduled for Sept. 8. Quattrone is likely to get 10 to 16 months in prison. His defense is planning an appeal, citing "an awful lot of evidence" that was kept away from the jury.

## Longest flight gets longer

Singapore Airlines said yesterday it will begin flying direct from the Southeast Asian city-state to New York in June, breaking its own record for the world's longest

nonstop commercial flight.

The Singapore-New York route will begin June 28, and planes will have special lounge areas. The 10,315-mile trip will take 18 hours. (AP)

## Jersey may allow betting on sports

Officials from Atlantic City casinos enthusiastically supported the idea of sports betting in New Jersey, but an NFL representative told an Assembly committee yesterday that legalizing gambling on games would be a mistake.

NFL attorney Jay Moyer urged lawmakers to drop their pursuit of bringing sports betting to Atlantic City because the move would encourage state residents to gamble and change the nature of how fans watch games.

"It would create a pervasive climate of suspicion about any controversial play in a game," Moyer said. "It would send two very bad messages. One is that anything goes when it comes to raising revenues and, two, that gam-

bling and sports are natural partners."

New Jersey officials are exploring the possibility of challenging a federal law that prohibits most states from allowing betting on sports. Assemblyman Jeff Van Drew (D-Cape May), said recent U.S. Supreme Court rulings involving interstate commerce would seem to offer hope to New Jersey.

"It does not seem implausible that the federal law is at least susceptible to a legal challenge," said Van Drew, the chairman of the Assembly Tourism and Gaming Committee.

Some lawmakers believe the increased revenue from sports betting would boost state coffers and make Atlantic City more attractive as a tourist destination. (AP)

## Officials downplay bomb test memo

Officials yesterday downplayed a transit security memo that warned that five suspicious bags left at spots around the city within one week — including an empty suitcase at Penn Station — may be a test run for bomb attacks.

The memo — issued by a security unit of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority — warned of the possible threat, and asked security patrols to report any similar findings of unattended bags.


The bags were discovered over about a week in late March and early April, said MTA spokesman Tom Kelly. Kelly said the memo was issued as a precaution.

### Priest indicted on nun slay

**TOLEDO, OHIO** A Roman Catholic priest was indicted Friday on an aggravated murder charge in the slaying of a nun 24 years ago. The Rev. Gerald Robinson was arrested April 23 in the strangling and stabbing of Sister Margaret Ann Pahl, 71, during Easter weekend in 1980. He was released from jail after supporters put together enough property to post a \$400,000 property bond to cover his \$200,000 bail.

### Husband almost shocks wife

**HENDERSON, TEXAS** A man set up a bubble bath for his wife and then tried to electrocute her by pushing a radio into the tub, authorities say. William Joseph Wolfe, 34, was arrested Thursday on charges of attempted murder. His wife told police her husband moved the radio from its usual place in the bathroom to a bench near the bathtub, with an extension cord running into another room. She caught the radio before it hit the water and later discovered that he had visited Web sites dealing with bathtub electrocution. Wolfe, freed on \$40,000 bail, could get up to 20 years in prison.

### Freight train collision

**SAN ANTONIO** Two freight trains collided yesterday on a Union Pacific track south of downtown San Antonio and injured three people. A UP freight train headed from Houston to Mexico was switching tracks when it struck a northbound UP freight headed to East St. Louis, Ill., at a railroad bridge over the San Antonio River, said UP spokesman Mark Davis. Two locomotives and 12 freight cars of the southbound train derailed, and both engines and five of the cars fell into the River. Container cars on the Mexico-bound train were carrying non-hazardous cargo, but the locomotives spilled a total of about 5,600 gallons of their diesel fuel into the river.

### Court: Minister's blessing OK

**CINCINNATI** A church court ruled yesterday that a Presbyterian minister did not violate church law by marrying same-sex couples, reversing a ruling by a lower court. The permanent judicial commission of the Presbyterian Church ruled 6-4 that the denomination's constitution does not prohibit ministers from marrying same-sex couples. While the constitution defines marriage as a covenant between a man and a woman, the church's highest court ruled in 2000 that ministers may bless same-sex unions, but cannot marry those couples. That interpretation makes same-sex marriages impermissible, but "it avoids an outright prohibition by using the words 'should' and 'should not' in guidance for church bodies and ministers," the judicial commission ruled. (AP)

## US soldiers disciplined

The U.S. military has reprimanded seven officers in the alleged abuse of inmates at Baghdad's notorious Abu Ghraib prison, the first known punishments in the case, an official said yesterday. Two of the officers were relieved of their duties.

The American officer who oversaw the prison said many more troops might have been involved.

The soldiers were reprimanded on the orders of Lt. Gen. Ricardo Sanchez, commander of U.S. forces in Iraq. Six of them — officers and noncommissioned officers — received the most severe administrative reprimand in the U.S. military, a military official said, speaking on con-

dition of anonymity. A seventh officer received a more lenient admonishment.


Two of the six were "released for cause," meaning they were relieved of their duties and reassigned "with prejudice," said Larry Di Rita, spokesman for Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld.

He also said that the six who received letters of reprimand were from a military police unit.

The official said he believed the seven officers would not face further action or court martial, but the reprimands could mean the end of their careers.

Another six U.S. service members — all military police — also may face criminal charges. (AP)

## Former hostage in good condition

Former American hostage Thomas Hamill, who escaped from three weeks of captivity in Iraq, was recovering from a bullet wound yesterday at a U.S. military hospital in Germany as he awaited a reunion with his wife.

Doctors at the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany had an upbeat diagnosis after examining the 43-year-old civilian contractor, who escaped his kidnappers Sunday in a daring run to freedom.

"He's doing good, very good," hospital spokeswoman Marie Shaw told The Associated Press, adding that he should be able to return home this week.

Kellie Hamill was flying over from their Macon, Miss., home for a reunion with her husband at Landstuhl today, military officials said. (AP)

### Bush to states: 'I understand'

### Pork rind recall

President Bush, winding his way by bus through job-strapped Michigan and Ohio, said yesterday that the region is still in the throes of an ailing economy.

Bush pointed out that the economy is showing signs of growth nationwide, "but lags in Michigan, I understand that."

In 1992, the perception that Bush, Sr., lacked empathy with hard-pressed working Americans contributed to his defeat.

The son is determined to avoid that image in his re-election bid. (AP)

A Chicago company recalled 24,700 pounds of pork rinds sold nationwide because they may be contaminated with salmonella, the Agriculture Department said yesterday.

Evans Food Products Co. issued the recall after tests showed the pork rinds may contain the bacteria.

The recalled items were sold under the product names of Old Dutch, Bac'n Puffs Brand; Original Oriental Delight; Better Made; Higglets; Simms; Hot & Spicy Flavored Pork Rinds; Salt & Vinegar, as well as Barbecue Flavored Pork Rinds. (AP)

## Car bomb kills three in Pakistan

**KARACHI** A car bomb shattered a bus carrying Chinese engineers to a port project in remote southwestern Pakistan yesterday, killing three in what the government called a terrorist attack. The Chinese government expressed deep concern and urged more protection for some 400 of its citizens working on the port project in Gwadar. "This is clearly terrorism. The aim was to terrorize the Chinese working at the Gwadar port," said Lal Jan, a senior police official.

## Prof again sentenced to death

**TEHRAN** A court in western Iran has reimposed a death sentence on a university professor for speaking out against Iran's hard-line clerical leaders, an official said yesterday, in a ruling that could revive massive protests at college campuses across the country. The original death sentence against Hashem Aghajari in 2002 sparked protests by students that led to violent clashes with hard-line vigilantes, a key episode in the ongoing power struggle between reformists and conservatives in Iran.

## France vows to fight anti-Semitism

**PARIS** France's prime minister vowed yesterday to keep watch on worsening anti-Semitism and racism and announced a ceremony later this week for a Jewish cemetery that was vandalized. "We do not want to close our eyes to a serious situation. We do not want to be a government that is deaf and blind to the rise of racism and anti-Semitism," said Jean-Pierre Raffarin after a meeting on the problem.

## Arnold meets with troops

**RAMSTEIN AIR BASE** California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger shared tales of his Austrian military experience with hundreds of U.S. troops in Germany during a stop yesterday on his way home from a Middle East trip. On stage with dozens of troops before a huge American flag, Schwarzenegger drew laughs from those assembled in a hangar with personal stories of his bodybuilding and political aspirations. (AP)

# Al Qaeda plotted attack on Bush

A Turkish court yesterday charged nine suspected members of a group linked to Al Qaeda in an alleged plot to set off a bomb at a NATO summit in Istanbul next month that President Bush is scheduled to attend.

Private CNN-Turk television said three of the suspects had been plotting a suicide attack on Bush and other Western leaders at the summit, but officials could not confirm the report.

Authorities detained 16 alleged members of Ansar al-Islam on Thursday in the northwestern province of Bursa, Gov. Oguz Kagan Koksal said. The suspects also planned to attack a synagogue in Bursa and rob a bank to raise funds, Koksal said.

A Turkish court that deals with terrorism cases charged the nine with "membership in an illegal organization." Conviction on the charge car-

ries a sentence of up to 10 years in prison.

Prosecutors earlier released the other seven suspects after questioning them. (AP)

## Israel responds to murder of mother and 4 daughters

**A day after Palestinian gunmen opened fire on an Israeli vehicle, killing a pregnant settler and her four young daughters, an Israeli attack helicopter fired a missile at a group of armed Palestinians in a Gaza refugee camp, killing two and wounding at least 17.**

Also, Israeli troops took up positions around Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat's office building in the West Bank city of Ramallah, witnesses said.

Residents who saw the Khan Younis refugee camp violence said the gunmen targeted by the helicopter fired two missiles at Israeli tanks before the helicopter struck.

Residents said the dead Palestinian was a 25-year-old gunman. As the attack occurred, the Israeli military was carrying out operations in

two parts of the camp. Tanks and bulldozers leveled land and tore down buildings across from a Jewish settlement. (AP)

## Ambassador tells Americans: Leave Saudi Arabia right now

**YANBU**, Saudi Arabia — The U.S. ambassador traveled to this Saudi oil-industry city yesterday with a simple message for the gathered Americans: Go home. We cannot protect you.

Huddled in a meeting room in a Holiday Inn still pockmarked with bullet holes after the latest in a string of attacks on Westerners killed two Americans and four others, many said they would heed

his words.

The first to go were among the 90 foreign employees of ABB Lummus Global Inc., a Houston-based oil contractor whose offices were attacked Saturday by four gunmen trying to encourage Saudis to fight against the U.S. occupation of Iraq. The Saudi interior minister said early today that the attack appeared to have been carried out by Al Qaeda. (AP)

## U.S., militias clash in Najaf

U.S. forces in Najaf, Iraq, came under their most intense attack yet by Shiite militiamen in a clash yesterday that may have killed up to 20 Iraqis. But the military still held back from going after the militia's leader, a radical cleric, to avoid angering Iraq's Shiite majority.

The U.S. turned to a new commander for an Iraqi force taking control of Fallujah, considering Maj. Gen. Mohammed Latif, who opposed Saddam Hussein, to replace another general.

In Baghdad, insurgents opened fire on U.S. soldiers guarding a weapons cache, killing one soldier and wounding two, the military said.

Elsewhere, a Marine was killed by enemy fire in Anbar province, the western Iraqi province where the turbulent cities of Ramadi and Fallujah are located. (AP)



## A cyclist's smile

Ever wondered why cyclists are smiling? Is it theendorphins they're releasing? The fresh air they're breathing? Or is it conquering a steep hill or whooshing down another? Whatever the reason — cyclists smile. But the smiles don't always come easy.

As we welcome May and shake off 2004's chill, it's time to flip up the kickstand. This marks the 48th year that the League of American Bicyclists has declared this month the time to roll.

Bike Month NYC hosts many programs, from safety and repair tips to a bicycle film. There's even a "National Bike to Work Day" on May 21. With 105,000 daily cyclists in New York City, Bike Month NYC strives to show how safe and fun cycling can be and how anyone can do it, not just the guys delivering your Chow Fun.

This past Sunday, the Five Borough Bike Tour attracted 30,000 cyclists. Even though I'm an avid rider, I decided to pass; I prefer the heart-pounding hills of Westchester, where roads are less populated by other cyclists, trucks, buses, taxis, pedestrians, potholes. And, well, the truth is, I was scared to ride in the city.

And rightly so. Two riders Sunday died from heart attacks, while 160 were injured, mostly scrapes and bruises. But

one rider suffered a broken leg.

When I learned to ride at age six — my dad holding the back of my banana seat and me saying, "You can let go now," only to find him waving from several driveways back — I never wanted to get off my bike. Tassels flowing freely from the ends of my handlebars, I loved the air in my face and the freedom to go fast. I was fearless. Until the accident.

At age nine, out for a ride on my bike, my front tire hit a rock and I flew over the handlebars. I landed on my face, bit the pavement and lost my two front teeth. My mother was not happy.

I was afraid to ride after that, the fun having given way to fear.

But last year I broke down and bought a road bike after sitting safely for years on fat-tire hybrids. A year later, I am still getting used to the idea of becoming one with two wheels and this sleek configuration of aluminum. I do not smile as each ride begins. My heart pounds, and I contemplate going for a run instead. But like Franklin Delano Roosevelt said, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself." So I push myself.

Focusing on the ground ahead, I search out debris, potholes or a quick chipmunk crossing my path. My gloved hands grip the bars. By the 10th mile, I begin to relax. By the 20th I'm singing a show tune. And by the time my odometer has logged in 40 miles, my fear has subsided. At least until the next ride. That is what conquering fear feels like. It never goes away, just gets easier. That is what makes this cyclist smile.

Last Friday, Jackson, pleaded innocent to charges of conspiring to commit child abduction, extortion and false imprisonment in a 10-count indictment recently handed up by a Santa Barbara County grand jury.

He is also accused of committing lewd acts on a child under the age of 14 and plying the boy with alcohol.



# Oil prices rise to highest level

The price of oil rose to its highest level in more than 13 years yesterday as traders responded to the weekend killing of five Westerners working for an oil contractor in Saudi Arabia.

The wholesale price of gasoline also reached a new record, signaling the likelihood of even higher pump prices by the end of May, which marks the beginning of the summer driving season.

Crude for June delivery gained 83 cents on the New York Mercantile Exchange, settling at \$38.21 per barrel — the highest price since Oct. 16, 1990, when oil was valued at \$38.89 per barrel.

The rally in oil prices was largely triggered by the violence in Saudi Arabia on Saturday, when four men opened fire on the offices of oil contractor ABB Lummus Global Inc. Two Americans,

Yesterday, unleaded gasoline futures increased 2.7 cents to \$1.263 per gallon. (AP)

# Flying surges by 10%

Air travel rebounded during the first three months of this year, rising 9.6% over the same period in 2003, the International Air Transport Association said yesterday.

IATA noted that the year-earlier figures were especially low because the SARS virus and the start of the war in Iraq frightened off many travelers.

"To survive, airlines reduced their cost structure and improved efficiency," said Giovanni Bisignani, director-general of the association.

March 2004 had a 13.3% increase in passenger traffic over the year earlier figure, IATA said. The organization didn't release the total number of passenger-kilometers (miles) flown for each period.

Traffic grew in all regions, the organization said. Middle Eastern carriers posted March year-on-year same month jumps of 40.2% for passenger traffic, it said.

• **Adelphia Communications Corp.:** Founder John Rigas and his two sons, as well as former assistant treasurer Michael Mulcahey, are on trial in federal court, accused of stealing tens of millions of dollars from the cable television giant's investors to support a lavish lifestyle.



• **Credit Suisse First Boston:** The company's former investment banking star Frank Quattrone was convicted yesterday on federal charges of obstruction of justice. His first trial last year ended in a hung jury. Quattrone made a fortune taking Internet companies public during the dot-com stock craze.

• **Enron Corp.:** Former chief executive Jeffrey Skilling pleaded innocent in February to fraud, conspiracy, insider trading and other federal counts related to the once-mighty energy giant's collapse. Former chief financial officer Andrew Fastow has pleaded guilty to two counts of conspiracy and agreed to cooperate with prosecutors.



• **Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia:** On March 5, a federal jury convicted company founder Martha Stewart of conspiracy, obstruction of justice and making false statements related to a personal sale of ImClone Systems stock. She has requested a new trial, saying one juror lied about his background. (AP)

# Adelphia trial gets adjourned for now

The judge yesterday adjourned the trial of four former top Adelphia Communications Corp. executives until further notice after one of the defendants reportedly took sick over the weekend.

Former Adelphia executive vice president Michael Rigas, 50, was hospitalized and released last weekend in Couderport, Pa., where Adelphia was based and where the Rigas family still

lives, according to a source familiar with the case, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

A lawyer for Michael Rigas declined to comment on his client's health or whereabouts.

Michael Rigas' father, John, and brother, Timothy, who are also on trial here on charges of conspiracy and fraud, weren't in the courtroom yesterday.

Another former Adelphia executive, Michael Mulcahey, is on trial with the three Rigas family members. (AP)



**Joshua Tree is far more than a vast expanse of sand and sky. It's composed of two ecosystems that meet at the heart of the park.**

The northwestern section of this California gem includes the high Mojave Desert, where the range of temperatures creates the perfect home for the park's namesake trees.

Below 3,000 feet, the eastern section of the park blends

into the drier, warmer western edge of the Sonoran Desert and features cholla cacti, wispy creosote bushes and ocotillo trees with branches tipped by flame-red blossoms.

More than a century ago, Mormons saw a biblical image. They were said to have named the trees after the prophet Joshua, who waved his arms to the heavens.

Bobcats, lizards, golden

eagles and my personal favorite, the kangaroo rat — which doesn't sweat and conserves water by excreting urine as a dryish paste — are among the hundreds of species that make their home in the 794,000-acre park.

Joshua Tree is located 140 miles east of Los Angeles, about a 2 1/2 hour drive if you miss the traffic. It's about 50 miles north of Palm Springs.

The park visitor center's newsletter offers a variety of

clearly marked hikes — from the hardcore, 16-mile Boy Scout Trail to the scenic, quarter-mile Cholla Cactus Garden loop.

Split Rock marks the beginning of Joshua Tree's incredible granite boulders worshipped by rock climbers around the world because of the 4,500 established climbing routes.

An easy path takes visitors away from the campgrounds along the desert floor. (AP)

## Pain in the what?

**Travel has rarely been kind to bad backs. Just the thought of long airport lines and crowded roadways can make your back muscles more tense, never mind having to schlep your own bag to the airline security inspectors.**

To minimize the risk, pay attention to good body mechanics, remember to do your preventive back exercises and consider toting along medicine and lumbar supports that will help buoy your back and ease a flare-up, experts suggest.

Once at your destination, investigate on-site services that can help, such as a warm hot tub or spa or a massage.

Suitcase mechanics can

help too, and that begins with not over-packing.

If you're healthy, your packed suitcase should weigh no more than 20% of your body weight, says Dr. Scott D. Boden, professor of orthopedics and director of the Emory Spine Center at the Emory University School of Medicine in Atlanta. For a 150-pound person, that's 30 pounds, probably less than many travelers pack.

If you have back pain, carry a lighter load. Boden instructs those with back problems to limit suitcase weight to 10 pounds if they must lift it.

When you have to lift the suitcase, remember to bend at the knees, not the hips, says Boden.





# Google's got 'em searching

For years, closely held Google Inc. had been so secretive that when it registered last week for an initial public offering, the crush of people trying to read it nearly crashed the Securities and Exchange Commission's Web site.

Googlephiles found plenty of tantalizing nuggets in the hefty document — the company's financial results, the salaries of its top executives, and the fact that it will lose the exclusive license to its search technology in 2011.

But the IPO filing left some Google watchers wanting more. To them, the prospectus was almost as

noteworthy for what it left out as for what it put in.

Google did not disclose how many people use its

search engine, how many queries it powers, how often people click on its advertisements or how quickly its traf-

fic is growing.


Also absent were the nuts-and-bolts of how Google's technology works. Wall Streeters would have flipped if Google had divulged the mathematical algorithms it uses to return search results.

"As a public company, we will of course provide you with all information required by law, and we will also do our best to explain our actions," co-founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin wrote in a letter to prospective shareholders enclosed in the filing. "But we will not unnecessarily disclose all of our strengths, strategies and intentions." *(LA Times)*



## A winner for Philly

Title-starved town falls for native horse Smarty Jones



Fellow jockeys welcomed Kentucky Derby winner Stewart Elliott back to Philadelphia yesterday.

Stewart Elliott had trouble describing how it felt to dart across the finish line aboard Smarty Jones in the Kentucky Derby. "It's something you have to experience to understand," he said. That's where you lose most Philadelphia fans and athletes.

Philadelphiaans are unaccustomed to feting champions — or being champions.

But a city yearning for a title from its disappointing big-bankroll pro teams — Eagles, Phillies, 76ers, Flyers — now has a hero in an undefeated 3-year-old colt and his Philly-area jockey, trainer and owners.

Philadelphia, where fans can be tougher than yesterday's cheesesteak and crankier than Phillies manager Larry Bowa, has suddenly found love in the underdog.

Sure, there was "Rocky" and the Villanova men's basketball team that won the national championship in 1985.

But this has been the year of the little teams — and colts — that could. First tiny St. Joseph's captivated college basketball with a 27-0 start and a run to the tournament's regional final. Now it's Smarty Jones.

"He wasn't supposed to be there," said Jim Weber, one of many fans who greeted Elliott's flight from Kentucky. "Horses from Philadelphia aren't supposed to be there." (AP)

## Danton extradited to St. Louis

Blues forward Mike Danton returned to the St. Louis area from California yesterday to face charges in an alleged murder-for-hire plot, a federal marshal said.

Danton arrived by airplane with other prisoners and received no special treatment, said Karen Simons, a chief deputy federal marshal.

He will be arraigned this afternoon in an East St. Louis federal court, U.S. Attorney Ronald Temps' office said.

Danton and 19-year-old Katie Wolfmeyer were indicted April 22 by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiring to arrange a murder for hire and using a telephone across state lines to arrange it. (AP)







## DICK POUND VS NADIA COMANECI

Twenty-eight years after her perfect-10 made her the darling of the 1976 Olympics, gymnast Comaneci is defending her score against accusations from Pound. The former IOC vice president writes in his forthcoming book, "Inside the Olympics," that Soviet judges awarded "slightly higher than normal" marks in a scheme to help Soviet athletes. The Romanian-born Comaneci received the first perfect marks in Olympic history on her way to the all-around gold. The Soviets won the team event.

Pound writes that the Soviet bloc came up with a strategy to raise marks for lesser gymnasts in order "to avoid the embarrassment of losing the team event without overtly unfair marking of the Romanian gymnasts." Giving Comaneci a perfect score, Pound writes, helped the judges create the illusion that they were being fair without causing serious harm to the Soviet team's chances.

Yesterday, Comaneci pointed out that she received "two 10s three months before in the American Cup." (AP)
